National Code of Show Ring Ethics

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics", fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels. All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards, and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animals health certificates from a licensed veterinarian upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of volatile drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animals entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations and rules.
5. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was

taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian, or on the order of a vet.

6. Any surgical procedure of injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
7. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
8. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair, and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
9. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
10. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
11. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this code of show ring ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including fairs and expositions and any other special notices to members.
12. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action, which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

General Rules

1. No alcoholic beverages are allowed on the fairgrounds, with the exception of the licensed beverage area as governed by the Fair Society. Allowable areas will be designated with signage present. Consumption of alcoholic beverages is allowed in the licensed beverage area only. Any persons found to have in possession, and/or consuming alcoholic beverages outside of the licensed beverage area will have beverages confiscated and could face criminal charges if the situation is determined to warrant the filing of criminal charges.
2. Absolutely no alcoholic beverages allowed in the youth areas of the fairgrounds and no alcohol may be consumed during any competition, shows, or other judging involving youth. Violation of this rule will result in the disqualification of the family from all activities and competitions of the Fair, forfeiture of all premiums, awards, and other prizes earned by the family, and the filing of criminal charges on the offending persons.
3. Fairgrounds close at 11:30 pm. Only fair board authorized personnel on the grounds after 11:30 pm.
4. All premiums for non-livestock and non-auction livestock projects will be forfeited if a project leaves the fairgrounds prior to 9 am the last day of the fair.

General Eligibility Guidelines:

4-H enrollments must be turned in by May 15. Livestock Verification (ID) must be completed by May 15. FairEntry and YQCA certifications are due by June 23

To show exhibits at the Floyd County Fair, all 4-H and FFA members must enroll their entries into the FairEntry online system at <http://floydcounty.fairentry.com>. FairEntry will be open to receive entries from May 16, 2023 through June 23 at 11:59 pm. All entries must be completed in FairEntry by Friday, June 23 or the member cannot show their exhibit. **There will be no exceptions for late entries.**

Livestock

1. BARNs CLOSE at 11:00 pm. No youth allowed in barns after 11:00 pm without an adult present.
2. Attire: Clothing must be neat and clean (NOT TORN OR FRAYED). Exhibitors are required to wear an FFA/4-H county or club shirt. No Royalty attire will be allowed when showing animals. NO HATS ALLOWED. ID number to be pinned to the back of the shirt while showing.
3. All livestock must be shown by a current Floyd County eligible 4-H or FFA member.
4. All 4-H members must attend at least two 4-H club meetings of the current 4-H enrollment year (starting in September) to be eligible to show at the Floyd County Fair.
5. All animals must comply with health regulations of the Iowa Department of Agriculture, Division of Animal Industry, Des Moines.

6. THE DECISION OF THE OFFICIAL SHOW VETERINARIANS WILL BE FINAL. Any evidence of contagious or infectious disease as determined by an official fair veterinarian will be eliminated from the show.
7. Clover Kids who have completed Kindergarten - 3rd grade will be allowed to show bucket/bottle calves, sheep, meat goats, rabbits, poultry, and pets with the help of their parent/guardian only. They will follow all rules of that particular species show including eligibility requirements. In keeping compliant with state rules, the youth will not be competing and will receive a participation ribbon only and no premiums.
8. There are no exhibitor entry fees or pen fees.
9. Only cash awards funded by the Fair Board are to be awarded.
10. Each participant must have their own ID form.
11. Animals changing ownership after being identified as a project are ineligible to be exhibited as 4-H animals for that current 4-H year.
12. No Livestock reweighing will be allowed at weigh-ins for any species.
13. Exhibitors are responsible to make sure their animals have adequate feed and water at all times. Failure to comply and the exhibitor will not be allowed to sell their animals in the auction.
14. Exhibitors are responsible to keep their pens, alleyways, and animals clean. Failure to comply and the exhibitor will not be allowed to sell their animals in the auction. Swine must use bagged woodchips or wood shavings in their pens.
15. Each exhibitor showing swine must have a Premise ID number.
16. Generators are to be kept outside of all livestock barns.
17. Swine, Sheep, and Broiler exhibitors: Siblings can identify market hogs, market lambs, and broilers as a partnership. 4-H and FFA members may not nominate, enter, nor show the same animals even though the animals may be owned in a sibling partnership.

Rule Changes for Livestock Species

1. Proposed changes for the livestock species should be submitted in writing or in person at the November Fair Board Meeting.
2. At the November meeting all superintendents are required to attend. Proposed rule changes will be reviewed and discussed by the superintendents at the meeting. Each proposal will then be discussed.
3. The Fair Board will make proposed rule changes for auction and general livestock rules. Herdsmanship and showmanship rules will be discussed by the entire group.
4. All proposed rules will then be made available to the Floyd County 4-H, FFA Chapters, and Fair Board to review. In early December a committee consisting of these entities will meet to finalize and approve all rule changes.
5. Livestock superintendents need to be in place by the November Fair Board meeting. If a superintendent is resigning from their position, please submit your resignation by September 1.

To Exhibit Livestock and Horticulture at the Iowa State Fair 4-H Show

1. All livestock must be weighed in on the official weigh-in dates specified for State Fair exhibits.
2. All livestock must be identified in 4HOnline by May 15th.
3. All Livestock and Horticulture State Fair entries must be submitted in FairEntry by July 1st at 11:59 pm.

Herdsmanship

Herdsmanship Goals

1. Ensure all animals have a high level of care during the fair.
2. Enable the public to observe the animals in an inviting atmosphere.
3. Encourage club/member pride in exhibits.
4. Promote club/chapter teamwork and friendship.

The individual exhibitor is responsible for herdsmanship. If a member is not able to check animals frequently during the day, the member must make arrangements with other club members, family, or club leader to do so.

Judging Rules

- Species to be judged will be: beef, dairy, horse, sheep, goat, swine, and bucket bottle calves.
- Judging will take place twice a day between 9 am and 6 pm. Exhibitors should have animal chores done by 9 am every day of the fair.
- On the show day of a particular species, there will be no judging one hour before or one hour after the show of the particular species.
- Judging results will be posted each day in the respective barns.
- Prize money will be awarded to the club/chapter with the highest number of points in each species. The amount will be pro-rated according to the number of clubs/chapters participating in each species. The amount awarded to the winning club/chapter will be determined by the number of entries in each species. Awards will be given to winning clubs at the annual 4-H Awards Night. FFA Chapters will receive their awards at the Advisor's discretion.

Scoring

- Cleanliness of Animals 20 points
Animals tied and pens securely fastened
- Feed and Equipment neatly arranged..... 20 points
Show Boxes, Grooming Chutes, Stall Cards, etc.
- Proper feeding and watering..... 20 points
Feed pans in pen and in front of animal only at feeding time
- Alley, Pens, Stalls neat and clean..... 20 points
Manure hauled and put in the proper place, alley swept and clean from manure
- Courtesy and conduct of exhibitors..... 20 points
Willingness to talk to visitors and answer questions.
- Total Points..... 100 points

Additional Information

- 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters are encouraged to have signs posted to identify themselves.
- Tools and equipment should be stored safely and out of the way of the public. (forks, rakes, etc. pointing down)
- If it is necessary to keep food and water in front of animals (hogs and sheep), containers should be fastened down.
- Exhibitors are encouraged to pick up trash, cups, cans, etc., not just in their exhibit area, but throughout the fairgrounds.

Showmanship

1. Showmanship classes will be held in the dairy cattle/goats, beef, sheep, swine, rabbits, horse, poultry, dog, and meat goats.
2. All 4-H and FFA exhibitors are eligible to participate. One 1st and 2nd place designation for showmanship will be made for the junior, intermediate, and senior age levels per species.
3. Recognition is given to exhibitors who do the best job of fitting and showing their animals and who make a neat appearance while showing. The knowledge of the project experience will also be evaluated.
4. The exhibitor must be showing his/her own animals.
5. An individual exhibitor cannot win first (in any one division) 2 years in succession. If an exhibitor wins their age division they may compete in the next older division the following year.
6. Exhibitors will be judged on showmanship while showing animals in the specific livestock classes.
7. The 1st and 2nd place showmen in each division will be selected from the best showmen in the class of that division.
8. In shows where there is less than two exhibitors in an age division all exhibitors will move accordingly. (ex. 7th graders move to Juniors/8th graders move to Seniors)
9. Showmanship is split into three divisions:
 - Junior-4th-6th grades
 - Intermediates-7th-8th grades
 - Seniors-9th-12th grades

Placing will be as follows:

- 1st Place-Banner
- 2nd Place-Banner

What's in a Ribbon?

Competition for premiums in 4-H and FFA classes is limited to youth enrolled in the Floyd County 4-H and FFA organizations. Youth must be in grades 4th-12th. Youth in K-3rd grades do not receive a competition ribbon or premium, but will receive a green ribbon of participation.

Premium awards are made and premium checks drawn only upon evidence contained in the judges' award books. Premium stickers or ribbons attached to exhibits will not be accepted as evidence that articles are entitled to premium payments.

Floyd County Fair Society – Discipline and Protest

Discipline:

Violation of any Fair Book Rules, and the Show Ring Code of Ethics, of the Fair, shall result in disciplinary action by a committee, acting for and appointed by the Board. Said committee shall consist of a 4-H Committee Member, Superintendent of the area of protest, Superintendent of an area not in protest, a FFA Instructor, an Extension Council Member, and a non-voting Fair Board Member. A Discipline Committee member cannot serve if they have a family member involved in the discipline.

The Floyd County Fair Society reserves to its Board the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, connected with, or incidental to the fair.

Protest:

1. All protests must be made in writing and accompanied by a nonrefundable deposit of \$200.00 in the livestock department and \$20.00 in all other departments. A current Floyd County Fair exhibitor or an exhibitor's immediate family member can only make protests. The protest needs to be submitted by the Protestor in person to the Fair Board Secretary.
2. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal, and must be filed with the Fair Board Secretary within 24 hours after cause of protest.
3. The Board will consider no complaint or appeal based upon the statement that the judge or judges are incompetent.
4. The person(s), exhibitor, or agent of the same, who the protest decision is rendered against shall pay all costs incurred in resolving the protest, including fees paid to persons hired by the Board to test, investigate and evaluate the animal or article that has been protested.

Livestock Auction Guidelines

Market Arrangement for Livestock

Animal Insurance: Due to stress factors and combat between strange animals at shows and in transit, it is recommended that owners get needed insurance. Water and feed is to be withheld from beef from 10 pm Saturday night until after auction weigh-in 6 am Sunday morning.

- **Beef** – All beef animals will be sold at auction on Sunday or taken home. Cattle sale order will be decided at random.
 - All Beef must weigh at least 1100 pounds to sell in the auction. A maximum pay weight of 1,600 pounds will be allowed in the auction. Example: An exhibitor can sell at auction a beef animal over 1,600 pounds but will only be paid on the 1,600 pound maximum weight. If a 1,678 pound steer is sold at auction, it will be paid at the price/pound of 1,600 pounds.
- **Sheep/Meat Goats** – All sheep/meat goats will be sold at auction or taken home. Sheep/meat goats sale order will be decided at random. **All sheep must be 110 pounds to sell at auction. All meat goats must be 50 pounds to sell at auction.**

Swine

1. Exhibitors will have the option to sell up to two swine at auction, sell animals to the designated packer or take their animals home after fair. Exhibitor may choose any swine that they bring to the fair to be put into the auction, market or carcass.
2. Animals condemned for drug residue are the responsibility of the exhibitor and will be required to reimburse buyer.
3. A maximum pay weight of 300 pounds will be allowed in the auction. Example: An exhibitor can sell at auction a market hog over 300 pounds but will only be paid on the 300 pound maximum weight. If a 325 pound hog is sold at auction, it will be paid at the price/pound of 300 pounds.
4. As decided by the Fair Board: Swine will be auctioned at a price per pound bid. Total pounds sold back to the packer will be divided into the check received from the packer to establish a “new” price per pound. Buyers will be compensated and checks dispersed to the buyers based on this formula. (All questions will be handled by the Fair Board in regards to the division of auction money.) With the exception of hogs going to lockers.
5. Each exhibitor must designate at fair animal check-in which 2 swine will be sold in the live auction.
6. No swine are allowed to leave the Fairgrounds without a swine superintendent present during the removal of said swine.

Auction Sale Procedure

- Each participant in the auction will get only 2 sales per species, per exhibitor.
- It is suggested that sheep be led into the auction ring on a halter.
- The seller must announce “NO SALE” before animals leave the sale ring.
- Resale will be allowed for the first two sales in each species, and must be announced by the seller before the animals leave the sale ring. The animals will be resold at the end of the auction. If the first sale is completed, the second sale will not have the resale option.

- **Superintendents reserve the right to pull animals from the auction if sick or unfit for sale.**
- If an animal is misrepresented (sick) when sold in auction ring, the buyer can reject if veterinarian confirms poor health of the animal.
- Water and feed is to be withheld from beef from 10 pm Saturday night until after auction weigh-in at 6 am Sunday morning.
- The Fair Board, Floyd County Extension, and commodity groups are not responsible for tanked animals.
- Youth are not responsible or liable for livestock after the sale. Out of courtesy and appreciation to the buyer, before leaving the fairgrounds Sunday night, please feed and water livestock that will be staying at the fairgrounds.
- All livestock sellers with the exception of outgoing seniors will be charged a 5% auction administrative fee.
- **All auction youth are to dress in a neat and professional manner. Show apparel including animal in show ready form. No hats, shorts, tank tops, or dirty/torn clothes will be allowed.**
- All auction participants are encouraged to send thank you notes to the buyers of their projects.

Order of Sale
Beef, Broilers, Swine, Meat Goats, Sheep
(Horses, Dairy, Poultry, and Rabbits will not be sold at auction.)

Animal Exhibits

Each exhibitor is responsible for the feeding and care of livestock exhibited. The fair management and junior livestock show department will use diligence to ensure the safety of animals entered for exhibition, after the arrival but under no circumstances will they be responsible for any loss, injury, or damage. It is the responsibility of the 4-H/FFA members to secure any cages, pens, or stalls that they feel needs to be secured by lock.

Beef

Superintendents: Joe Paulus and Bruce Koebrick

Exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the General Rules.

- All beef animals exhibited at fair must clearly be dehorned. Regrowth or scurs are deemed a safety hazard and will be disqualified. Unruly animals will not be judged and will be disqualified. These safety issues will be addressed by the beef superintendents.
- Any animal that becomes wild or uncontrollable causing a safety concern during the show may be declared ineligible by one of the beef superintendents.
- Maximum of 10 head for market may be weighed in for fair. 3 head may be used for halter animals.
- Painting, dyeing and use of color agents on beef animals is not condoned. Exhibitors can use colored grooming aids on hooves only. If a color or coloring agent rubs off an animal rubbed either by a towel or hand, that animal will be disqualified. All 1st and 2nd place class winners will be toweled.
- No artificial aides such as tail head or tail fins will be permitted.
- No unnatural means of providing an animal feed, water, or other fluids (i.e. stomach pump, IV) will be allowed.
- It is the intent that the 4-H/FFA member take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animals. If assistance is needed it should be aimed at helping the exhibitor learn new skills and be done by a family member and/or another Floyd County Fair exhibitor. Any animal fitted not in accordance to these rules is subject to disqualification.
- Only exhibitors and family members will be allowed to fit and groom beef animals. Any animal fitted in an unethical manner may be disqualified. Anyone requesting an exception to this rule must have a letter submitted to the superintendents at least one week prior to fair.
- For beef only overhead fans located in front half of stalling area will be allowed. No air duct apparatuses will be permitted. The use of butt fans is prohibited in the barn.
- Grooming shoots will be allowed only inside the barn during the show and auction. GENERATORS ARE TO BE KEPT ON OUTSIDE OF BARN.
- All weigh-in paperwork needs to be at the Extension Office before fair if weighed at another county weigh-in.
- Class Winners and/or judge's discretion will be eligible for top 5 selection. (Market Heifers are included in this decision.)

County Origin Contest

Market beef project animals may compete in the County Origin Contest if they meet the following:

- Member submitted a completed and signed county origin form to the Extension Office by or on the weigh-in date in December.

- Is one of the top two County Origin animals in its market heifer or steer weight class.

Market Beef Steer

Market Dairy Steer (must weigh-in and identify at Beef Weigh-In)

Market Beef Heifer

- Placement will be on individual merit by meat animal standards - confirmation quality, finish, breed, type and rate of gain.
- A maximum of 3 beef may be shown by an exhibitor as individual.
- All market animals are automatically entered in the rate of gain contest.
- Market Cattle will be weighed and unloaded Wednesday night. Judging classes/groups will be determined by weights.
- Market Beef, Dairy Steer, and Beef Heifer will be considered for Grand Champion Market Beef Overall.

Beef Rate of Gain

- Steers will qualify for the purple and blue award only if they have an average daily gain (ADG) of 2.3 pounds or more from the beginning weigh date (December) to the Floyd County Fair weigh date (July).
- Market Heifers and Dairy Steers will qualify for the purple and blue award only if they have an average daily gain (ADG) of 2.1 pounds or more from the beginning weigh date (December) to the Floyd County Fair weigh date (July).
- Rate of Gain will be posted on each exhibitors' shirt.

Returning Bucket / Bottle Calf

- The animal must have been shown as a bucket/bottle project the previous years.

Breeding Beef Heifer

- Date of birth required for ID.

Cow/Calf at Fair

- Beef breeding entries cannot be entered in market class of sale.
- Purebred or grade heifers may be shown.
- All breeds are entered in any one class.
- Breeding Beef Heifer will be shown on halter in the show ring.
- Cow/Calf at fair will be shown on halter in the show ring.
- Animals entered in Breeding Heifer and Cow/Calf at fair will be considered for Grand Champion Breeding Beef Project.
- 12th grade exhibitors are encouraged to exhibit their entire project on show day to demonstrate the herd development and growth that is possible in the breeding beef

project. These exhibitors will be expected to keep one cow/calf pair on the fairgrounds during fair and may keep the entire herd (space permitting) with prior approval of the beef superintendents. Premiums in Cow/Calf on farm will be paid on the basis of 1 entry regardless of the number of animals involved.

- Breeding beef judging at fair is totally on the animals; not project knowledge.

Cow/Calf on Farm

- On-farm judging will be through conference judging with half the points based on project knowledge and half on animal quality.
- All cow/calf animals in the exhibitors project herd will be judged on the farm. Beef heifer calves and yearlings (halter animals) may be included at exhibitor option.
- Exhibitors who have only beef heifer calves and/or yearlings have the option of participating in on-farm judging.
- Breeding herd exhibitors 4th-6th grades (the recently completed grade) will be in the junior on-farm division with grand and reserve designations. Exhibitors in 7th-8th grades will be in the intermediate on-farm division with grand and reserve designations. Exhibitors in 9th-12th grades will be in the senior on-farm division with grand and reserve designations.
- On-farm exhibitors will be recognized during the breeding beef show at fair.

Bucket/Bottle Calf-Clover Kids (K-3rd gr.)

- Class is open to any bull, heifer, or steer calf born between February 1-May 15
- Calf must be bucket or bottle fed. No nursing.
- 4-H & FFA members must verify and identify calf by May 15. (This includes Kindergarten - 3rd grade Clover Kids.)
- Calves will be shown at halter. Only 1 calf may be shown by exhibitor.
- Judging will be based on what the member has learned about care and raising, grooming and cleanliness, and general health of the calf. Open to all Junior and Senior 4-H & FFA members.
- All calves can be entered in market or breeding classes next year.
- Kindergarten - 3rd grade Clover Kids will not be judged in competition. They may show with a parent/guardian and receive a green participation ribbon.

Dairy Cattle

Superintendents: (Open position)

Exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the General Rules.

- An exhibitor can show a total of 6 head (heifers and cows). Unruly animals will not be permitted to show.
- Purebred and grade heifers will be shown together.
- Limited to one purchased heifer per class. Any heifer is considered purchased except daughters of present or former 4-H/FFA heifers enrolled as a project.
- All animals in this division will be considered for Grand Champion Dairy Cattle Project.
- Cows in milk may be removed from fairgrounds after showing, **with permission from the superintendent.**
- Birth or age requirements for classes as follows:
 - Heifer Calf-September 2022 - April 2, 2023
 - Yearling Heifer-September 2021 - September 2022
 - 2 Year Old Heifer-September 2020 - September 2021
 - Cow - Before September 2019

- All calves can be entered in market or breeding classes next year.
- Clover Kids (kindergarten - 3rd grade) will not be judged in competition. They may show with a parent/guardian and receive a green participation ribbon.

Dogs

Superintendent: Alyssa Staudt

Exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the General Rules.

- All dogs must have a current vaccination records including rabies, distemper-parvo and Kennel cough.
- Vaccination records must be uploaded into 4HOnline and presented at check-in the day of the show.
- Limit 2 dogs per exhibitor per class.
- Exhibitor must attend 3 dog training sessions with the dog(s) to be eligible to show at Fair.
- Dogs will not be housed at the fairgrounds, need only be on fairgrounds during dog show.
- Dogs cannot be entered in both Pet Show and Dog Show.
- Dogs will be health inspected by the Superintendent at check-in the day of the Dog Show.
- Dogs must be on leash and collar while at the Fair and not enter any other livestock building or playground areas.
- Females in season cannot be shown.
- Exhibitor must handle their dog without outside assistance.
- Non-show dogs except for disability assistant dogs will not be allowed in or around the show arena during the Dog Show.
- Dog exhibitors are responsible for cleaning up after their dog(s) while at the Fairgrounds.
- All dogs must be entered in an obedience class in order to be shown in any agility, rally, and/or showmanship class.

Intro Obedience

1st year for both exhibitor and dog. Dog must not have earned any obedience title. Heel, Figure 8, Sit for Examination, Recall, Long Sit for 1 Minute, Long Down for 1 Minute - Each 40 pts.

Beginner Novice A

2nd year for both exhibitor and dog. Dog must not have earned any obedience title. Heel, Figure 8, Sit for Examination, Sit/Stay - Handler walks ring drop all on leash - each 40 pts., Recall no finish off leash - 40 pts.

Beginner Novice B

3rd year exhibitor / 3rd year dog if they did not receive qualifying score in Beginner Novice B or exhibitor or dog with previous training experience but 2nd year for the other team member. Exhibitor / Dog team may not enter this class until the exhibitor has received a qualifying score. Dog must not have earned any obedience title. Heel, Figure 8, Sit for Examination, Sit/Stay - Handler walks ring drop all on leash - each 40 pts., Recall no Finish off Leash - 40 pts.

Preferred Novice A

Exhibitor/Dog team may enter this class 1 year. Dog must not have earned any leg towards any CD obedience title. Heel & figure 8 on leash 40 pts, Stand for Examination off leash 40 pts, Heel Free off leash 40 pts, Recall with finish off leash 40 pts, Down/Sit Handler walks ring drop leash 40 pts.

Preferred Novice B

Exhibitor/dog team may not enter this class till the exhibitor has received a qualifying score. Dogs must not have earned any leg towards any CD obedience title. Heel & Figure 8 on leash 40 pts, Stand for Examination off leash 40 pts, Heel Free off leash 40 pts, Recall with finish off leash 40 pts, Down/sit handler walks ring 40 pts

Exhibitor/dog team may enter this class 1 year. Dogs must not have earned any legs towards any CD obedience title. Heel on leash & Figure 8 40 pts, Stand for Examination 30 pts, Heel free off leash 40 pts, Recall with Finish off leash 40pts, Sit Stay get your leash 30 pts, Group Exercises Sit & Down Stay 30

Novice B

Exhibitor/dog team may not enter this class until the exhibitor has received a qualifying score. Dog may not have earned a third leg towards any CD title. Heel on leash and Figure 8 40 pts Stand for Examination 30 pts, Heel free off leash 40 pts, Recall with Finish off leash 40 pts, Sit stay get your leash 30 pts, Group Exercises Sit and Down Stay 30 pts

Graduate Novice A

FOR DOGS THAT ARE NOT QUITE READY FOR DUMBBELL WORK, Heel free and figure 8 off leash 40 pts. Moving Drop on recall 40 pts, Moving stand on recall 30 pts, Recall over Broad Jump 30 pts, Recall over High Jump 30 pts, Stay get your leash (sit or down) 30 pts

Graduate Novice B

This class is for exhibitor/dog team that is just beginning dumbbell work. Exhibitors must provide their own dumbbell for this class. Dogs must not have earned any legs towards any CDX titles. Heel free and Figure 8 40 pts, Drop on recall 40 pts, Dumbbell Recall 30 pts, Dumbbell Recall over High Jump 30 pts, Recall over Broad Jump 30 pts, Stay get your leash (sit, down) 30 pts

AGILITY CLASSES

Pre-Novice Agility

For dogs and exhibitors in their first year of dog training. Dogs will follow course on leash. Time standard will be based on two minutes. Penalties will be assessed for any time over. This class is open to exhibitors showing in Beginner Novice A

Novice Agility

For exhibitors in their second year or greater and dogs who are in their first to third year of training. Dogs will follow a course on or off leash. If the dog is on leash, a 5-point deduction will be assessed immediately. If dog is off leash, a 1-point deduction will be assessed each time the leash is touched. Time standard will be based on 1 minute 30 seconds and penalties will be assessed for any time over. This class is open to exhibitors in Beginner Novice B

Open Agility

For exhibitors in their second year or greater and dogs who are in their fourth year or greater of training. Dogs will follow a course off leash. Time standard will be based on 1 minute. Penalties will be assessed for any time over. This class is open to exhibitors in Graduate Novice A, Graduate Novice B, and Open

RALLY CLASSES

Rally Novice

This class is for dogs and handlers in their second and third year of training. The dog and handler team will move continuously through a rally course of 10 to 20 signs with the dog at the handler's side. At each numbered sign they will perform the indicated exercise then move to the next sign. Unlimited communication is encouraged, and the handler can talk to the dog and give multiple commands and signals. All exercises are judged on a leash and all dogs must enter and leave the ring on a leash. The leash must be 6 ft long. Handlers will be given a course ahead of time to practice.

Rally Open

This class is for dog and handlers in their third or greater year of Rally training. The dog and handler team will move continuously through a rally course of 10 to 20 signs with dog at the handler's side. At each numbered sign they will perform the indicated exercise then move to the next sign unlimited communication is encouraged and the handler can

talk to the dog and give multiple commands and signals. All exercises are judged on or off leash if the handler chooses to do on leash there will be a 5- point penalty. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The leash must be 6 ft long. Handlers will practice all signs that will be judged but will not get a course until the day of the show.

SHOWMANSHIP/HANDLING CLASSES

This is based on the grade the exhibitor just completed. Scoring is based on handling ability, grooming of dog, appearance of handler and oral questions.

Pet Show

Exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the General Rules.

- Each exhibitor is limited to a maximum of 2 entries.
- Exhibitors must meet with the Superintendent 1 time before the day of the show.
- Exhibitors must provide restraints, cages, or containers for entry.
- Entries will not be housed on the fairgrounds and will be brought for the show and then taken home.
- Pet show exhibits cannot be shown as an exhibit in another project area.
- All dogs and cats exhibited must present evidence of a current rabies vaccination certificate at the show.
- Exhibitors must prepare a folder to accompany the pet which includes: breed of pet or name of species; age or birth date; characteristics or habits of the pet; care of the pet such as special diets, needs, etc.; exhibitor's name, age and number of years with the pet; any experiences the exhibitor has had with the pet which was a learning experience; pictures of the pet in action may be included but are not required.
- Kindergarten - 3rd grade Clover Kids will not be judged in competition. They may show with a parent/guardian and receive a green participation ribbon.

Exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the General Rules as directed and in the 4-H Rules and Regulations for Equine Shows in Iowa handbook.

Exhibitor / Identification Requirements

- Classification: Junior Members: 4th-7th graders, Senior Members: 8th-12th graders (Grade completed as of May the current year)
- Exhibitor can make only 1 entry per class.
- A horse exhibited in the Ranch Horse Pleasure class may not show in the Western Pleasure class.
- Total of 3 animals may be identified and a maximum of 2 horses can be leased. Leased animals can only be shown in riding classes. Horse in halter or conformation classes must be owned by the 4-H/FFA member.
- The horse's name, sex, height, age, breed, and color markings (include a sketch or photo) are all required for identification. If a family includes more 4-H members than horses, more than one 4-H member may identify a horse; however, in this situation a 4-H member cannot identify more than one horse. Animals identified as part of a 4-H project cannot be identified or exhibited as an FFA project.
- The height of the horse or pony (in inches) is to be given in 4HOnline by May 15. Ponies are any equine under 14.1 hands. A horse is any equine over 14.1 hands (57 inches).
- Male weanlings may be shown, but yearlings and other stallions are ineligible for 4-H shows.
- A colt or filly foaled after June 1 is eligible for show during the current year only if it is the foal of a regularly identified 4-H project mare and is shown in a mare and foal class.
- All horses will be required to stay for the duration of the fair with the exception of mares with colts and yearling horses. Anyone requesting early release must have a letter submitted to the superintendent at least one week prior to the fair.

Exhibitor Appearance

- Clothing must be neat and clean (NOT TORN OR FRAYED).
- Exhibitors should wear attire appropriate to match the breed of their horse (i.e. Western or English).
 - In Western halter and showmanship classes, the exhibitor is expected to wear a cowboy hat and boots.
 - In Western pleasure and timed events, the exhibitor is required to wear ASTM/SEI approved helmets and boots.
 - Western Attire:

- White or solid colored long sleeve shirts or blouses with buttons, zippers, or snaps and a collar (tuxedo shirts allowed) are required. A necktie, kerchief, or bolo tie are permitted but not required.
 - Dark blue jeans without holes must be worn. A belt is required.
 - Shirts must be tucked in.
- English Attire:
 - ASTM/SEI approved helmet.
 - Breeches are to be of traditional colors such as navy, dark green, gray, black, or brown. Maroon and red are improper colors.
 - Shirts of any color with tie or choker are preferred.
 - Hair must be neat and contained (as in net or braid).
 - Exhibitors must wear high English boots or paddock boots of black or brown color.
 - Horse must be outfitted with proper English tack.
- Sleeveless shirts or blouses, turtleneck sweaters, sweaters, vests, shorts, etc. are not permitted.
- No glitter, bling, or ribbons on horses during competition.

General Horse Show Rules

- **All horses must be under control at all times with dismissal at the discretion of the superintendent. Examples of not being under control are as follows:**
 - Runaway horse
 - Bucking
 - Rearing
 - Kicking / biting other horses
 - Show managers or judges reserve the right to refuse an exhibitor entry into any class or event or excuse an exhibitor from any class if they deem the horse unsafe for exhibitors or other exhibitors' animals.
- All horses must remain in the horse arena area and south and west of driveways during all workouts and fair. Riding horses is not allowed in barns and remainder of the fairgrounds.
- In all mounted classes, exhibitors shall enter the arena mounted at a walk. Exhibitors in timed classes shall dismount before leaving the ring.
- Horses can only be led up to the gate by an immediate family member.
- Ribbons will be awarded for all classes.
- Awards will be presented following the horse show.
- All horse exhibitors must attend 2 Floyd County scheduled horse workouts in order to participate in the Horse Show. No Exceptions! Workouts are run by the superintendents.
- No alcoholic beverages allowed on the fairgrounds, with the exception of the licensed beverage area as governed by the Fair Society. Allowable areas will be designated with

signage present. Consumption of alcoholic beverage allowed in the licensed beverage area only. Any persons found to have in possession, and/or consuming alcoholic beverages outside of the licensed beverage area will have beverages confiscated and could face criminal charges if the situation is determined to warrant the filing of criminal charges. Absolutely no alcoholic beverages allowed in the youth areas of the fairgrounds and no alcohol may be consumed during any competition, shows, or other judging involving youth. Violation of this rule will result in the disqualification of the family from all activities and competitions of the Fair, forfeiture of all premiums, awards, and other prizes earned by the family and the filing of criminal charges on the offending persons.

Helmet Policy:

All 4-H related horse events across the state of Iowa will require the use of ASTM/SEI approved protective headgear with chin strap and properly fitted harness when mounted, riding, and driving. Every Time, Every Ride.

Exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the General Rules.

- Each owner may enter 3 wethers or does. NO Pygmy Goats may be shown. Animals must be born after January 1 of the current year to be eligible to be shown.
- Each exhibitor may identify 6 animals. All market animals must be tagged and identified by May 15. Floyd County Extension and Iowa FFA will have tags and taggers available.
- Only exhibitors and family members will be allowed to fit and groom goats. Any animal fitted in an unethical manner may be disqualified. Anyone requesting an exception to this rule must have a letter submitted to the superintendent at least one week prior to fair.
- The show is open to any breed or crossbred wether or doe.
- Wethers or does must have all milk teeth in normal position at check-in.
- Exhibitors will be required to have all horns tipped blunt (blunt enough not to be a safety hazard).
- NO painting, powdering, and/or artificial coloring is allowed. Clipping of the tail is optional.
- Wether and doe goats must weigh a minimum of 50lbs at fair time and must be 55lbs to sell at auction. (55-80lbs ideal market weight)
- All goats that will be sold at Fair Auction must have a Scrappie Tag.
- Goats must be broke to lead. Exhibitors will be allowed to use halters, collars, and collar with a short lead in the show ring.
- Wether, buckling or doe goats must be free of any sign of disease and external parasites or they will be disqualified.
- Classes will be determined by weight of animals at time of weigh-in at fair.
- Kindergarten - 3rd grade Clover Kids will not be judged in competition. They may show with a parent/guardian and receive a green participation ribbon.

Exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the General Rules.

- All sheep must be tagged and identified by May 15. Floyd County Extension and Iowa FFA will have tags and taggers available.
- A maximum of 10 market lambs may be tagged.
- All Market Lambs must be slick shorn prior to weigh-in at fair.
- Exhibitors may make 1-4 entries in 5-3-38 (Market Lamb). Exhibitors must write one entry for each lamb that will be exhibited in this class, enter twice for two entries and three for three entries in a class.
- **Exhibitors are limited to one lamb weighing less than 110 lbs.**
- Market Lambs must be castrated and docked.
- All Market Lambs must have Scrapie Tag.
- Animals entered in Market Lamb will be considered for Grand Champion Market Lamb.
- Classes may be divided by breed or weight as deemed necessary by the superintendents.
- All market sheep exhibited must have been lambed after January 1 of the current year.
- **Only animals in Market Lambs will be eligible for sale at the auction. Lambs weighing less than 110 lbs. are not eligible for sale at the auction.**
- It is the intent that the 4-H/FFA member take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animals. If assistance is needed it should be aimed at helping the exhibitor learn new skills and be done by a family member and/or another Floyd County exhibitor. Any animal fitted not in accordance to these rules is subject to disqualification.
- Only exhibitors and family members will be allowed to fit and groom lambs. Any animal fitted in an unethical manner may be disqualified. Anyone requesting an exception to this rule must have a letter submitted to the superintendents at least one week prior to fair.
- Kindergarten - 3rd grade Clover Kids will not be judged in competition. They may show with a parent/guardian and receive a green participation ribbon.

Club/Chapter Group of 3 Sheep

- A club may have only one entry in each class. Recognition to be given to the clubs doing the best job of choosing and showing their group of 3 animals.
- The 3 animals need not be of one breed. Each animal in the “group” is to be owned by a different member of the club.
- The club/chapter leader and officer choose the animals for the “group”.
- Four club members bring their animals into the ring; the owner with each animal and another member to marshal them in and act as herdsman and showman.
- Group of 3 is to be judged at the end of each division. Minimum of 3 groups to hold the competition.

- Judging Criteria: Personal Appearance-20%, Showmanship-30%, Sportsmanship-20%, Animal Uniformity-30% (weight and finish more than breed)

- Lambs shown in this class can also be shown in other sheep divisions.

Swine

Superintendents: Chuck Staudt, Alex Montagne, and Devon Murray

Exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the General Rules.

- **Exhibitors may enter swine in 4-H or FFA but not both.** Exhibitors may ID as many pigs as they wish and identify in 4HOnline by May 15.
- All market, carcass, purebred and commercial gilts must be tagged and identified by May 15. Floyd County Extension and Iowa FFA will have tags and taggers available.
- All swine are subject to a random urine test at the Floyd County Fair.
- **Swine superintendents reserve the right to refuse pigs to the show ring due to the pig being unfit to show.**
- Champion & Reserve Champion from the Market Gilt, Market Barrow & Market Purebred classes will compete for the top 5 market pigs at the Floyd County Fair. Overall Champion & Reserve Champion will have the option to compete at The North Iowa Showdown in August 2023 in Britt, IA.
- Purebred Swine shown in the market purebred class must bring pedigree papers for each purebred pig at the Floyd County Fair weigh in.
- We will have a market purebred class for each breed that has 3 or more animals registered at the Floyd County Fair. We will have an additional class of All Other Breeds (AOB) for all other breeds that have 2 or less animals.
- A maximum of 8 pigs may be entered at the fair per individual.
- Exhibitors may bring 2 crossbred market pigs of any sex, 2 market purebreds of any sex, 2 carcass pigs of any sex, and 2 commercial gilts to the Floyd County Fair.
- All classes at the Floyd County Fair will be split by fair entry weight. If an exhibitor has two animals in one class due to the fair entry weight, the exhibitor has the option to move one animal up into the next weight class if there is a heavier weight class above them.
- Any animal identified can be exhibited in either the market, carcass or commercial gilt classes.
- **Each exhibitor must have a Premise ID number.**
- Exhibitors must use bagged woodchips or wood shavings in their pens at fair.
- Exhibitors are not allowed to use any waterers at fair that will create a mess in the pen or alley. Open troughs, barrels, rubber or tin devices are examples of waterers not allowed.
- Each exhibitor is responsible for:
 1. Knowing their stall number
 2. Pigs getting to and from the show arena
 3. Keeping their pens and aisle clean
- Any exhibitor that does not comply with the General Rules or the Swine rules will be prohibited from showing and selling their animals at the Floyd County Fair

Exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the General Rules.

- An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of field crops.
- Limit of 1 entry each (per 4-H and FFA) in corn, hay, oats, and soybeans.
- Grand and reserve champion awards will be made in each crop production category: corn, hay, oats, and soybeans. Each category is a totally separate contest with points tabulated within that category only. No points or preference will be given to multiple category entries by an exhibitor.
- All entries will be judged in the field prior to the fair: Weed Control-10%, Population-15%, Fertility Program-15%, Insect Control-10%, Appearance and Plant Vigor-10%, Answering Questions-20%, Records and Project Knowledge-20%
- Each agronomy exhibitor will be mailed a scorecard and a project information sheet after entry is made. The exhibitor should have the project information sheet filled out prior to field judging and present it to the judge.
- Awards and premiums will be determined by the field judging.
- Exhibitor will prepare a display of 1 peck of oats, 2 or more stalks of corn, 4 or more soybean plants, or 1/3 bale of hay. 4-H corn or soybean displays are to be planted in a green 5-gallon pail and FFA in a blue 5-gallon pail.

General Eligibility Guidelines:

4-H enrollments must be turned in by May 15.

To show exhibits at the Floyd County Fair, all 4-H and FFA members must enroll their entries into the FairEntry online system at <http://floydcounty.fairentry.com>. FairEntry will be open to receive entries from May 16, 2023 through June 23 at 11:59 pm. All entries must be completed in FairEntry by Friday, June 23 or the member cannot show their exhibit. **There will be no exceptions for late entries.**

If you need assistance, contact the Floyd County Extension Office. Office hours are Monday through Friday 8 am to 4:30 pm.

General Rules for the Exhibit Hall

1. All exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the Iowa State Fair General Exhibit Rules for the exhibit to be eligible for Iowa State Fair participation.
2. It is required that a 4-H Club, Floyd County 4-H, or FFA Chapter shirt be worn during judging. No Royalty attire will be allowed when exhibiting projects. You are representing Floyd County 4-H and FFA and in doing so, dress appropriately at all times.
3. All 4-H members must attend at least two 4-H club meetings of the current 4-H enrollment year (starting in September) to be eligible to show at the Floyd County Fair.
4. Exhibits not registered in FairEntry prior to the fair entry deadline will not be judged or displayed at fair.
5. Exhibit classes are broad categories. To plan exhibits, 4-H members are encouraged to use project guides, manuals, hot sheets, and program materials to determine goals and learning experiences. Some project hot sheets include specific exhibit suggestions and procedures. An exhibit can represent an idea, a part, or all learning involved in the respective project or program.

6. 4-H members who have completed 4th-12th grade (or the equivalent) may exhibit at the Floyd County Fair. 4-H members in 5th-12th grade are eligible to advance or exhibit at the Iowa State Fair. 4-H Clover Kids (K-3rd grade) will be allowed to take non-livestock exhibits to the Floyd County Fair. Their exhibits may be displayed in the “Clover Kid Booth” or with a club they have been attending. In keeping with compliance with state rules the youth will not be competing and will receive a participation ribbon and no premiums.
7. Eligible exhibits are an outgrowth of work done as a planned part of the 4-H member’s participation in 4-H projects or programs during the current 4-H year. Exhibits can be done by an individual or group and may represent all or part of the learning in the project area.
8. Exhibits that do not comply with the class description, size guidelines, copyright restrictions, safety and approved methods will be disqualified and not put on public display.

9. If the exhibitor chooses a display to illustrate what was learned:
 - Posters may not exceed 24" x 36" in size.
 - Chart boards, graph boards, project presentation boards, model displays, etc., may not exceed 48" x 48" in size. Maximum size is determined by measuring the flat (unfolded) dimensions.
 - Display boxes may not exceed 28" x 22" in height or width and 12" in depth.
10. Endangered and threatened plants and animals (including insects) or songbirds should not be used in any exhibit. Wildflowers taken from parks should not be used. It is illegal to possess songbird feathers or nests. Game animals "legally taken" such as pheasant, goose, duck, or quail are acceptable. Purple loosestrife (*Lythrum salicaria*) are plants that should not be planted in gardens. It has a potential of becoming noxious in Iowa. Other dried established noxious weeds are acceptable to use in exhibits.
11. Copyrighted materials and designs may not be used in an exhibit that is presented as original work by the exhibitor. Exhibitors must include permission from the copyright holder/owner when using copyrighted materials. Exhibitors must give proper credit to the original source of all materials/designs used in exhibits. (See special rules for Visual Arts and general copyright info. for 4-H members.)
12. The 4-H member's goal and applicable exhibit standards will form the basis of the evaluation process. Evaluation criteria will include demonstrated learning, workmanship and techniques, and general appearance and design. Refer to exhibit class evaluation rubrics for detailed evaluation criteria in each class. Rubrics are located on each 4-H project page at: <http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/projects>
13. A written explanation, audio recording, or video recording is to be included as part of each exhibit. The exhibitor should respond briefly to the following questions about the exhibit:
 - What did you plan to learn or do? (What was your exhibit goal(s)?)
 - What steps did you take to learn or do this?
 - What were the most important things you learned?
14. School projects may be exhibited if the exhibitor has applied rule 13.
15. Any project without a goal card will be dropped one ribbon color.
16. Check for additional requirements to exhibit classes for clothing and fashion, food and nutrition, home improvement, photography, visual arts, and 4-H poster communication.
17. Judges have 7-10 minutes to evaluate the total exhibit. All judge's decisions are final.
18. Each item in an exhibit must be securely labeled (the entry tag is not a label), including the name of the club and exhibitor's name. Labels should be placed on the back of posters, notebooks, photographs, and in an inconspicuous place on other items. An entry tag should be securely fastened to the main item in each exhibit on or near the upper right corner or in an easily seen location.
19. Due to security, 4-H members are discouraged from sending items that have special meaning and historical value as the exhibit or part of an exhibit. The Floyd County Fair and Iowa State University Extension will use diligence to ensure the safety of articles

entered for exhibition after their arrival and placement. However, they will not be responsible for damage or loss by fire, theft, etc.

20. All exhibit activities and programs must represent appropriate safety procedures in the development of the exhibit and during the evaluation process. (This includes static exhibits and activities revolving around the communications program.)

4-H State Fair Exhibits

1. To exhibit at state fair, 4-H members must have completed 5th grade and not have graduated from high school before this year.
2. All exhibit hall projects will be eligible for state fair exhibit except Challenge Classes, Agronomy, Horticulture, Tall Corn Contest, and Recycled Art Contest.
3. The State Fair will not accept exhibits that do not meet the size rules.
4. “Considered for State Fair” ribbons will be awarded to outstanding exhibits. Purple “State Fair” ribbons will be awarded to those advancing to State Fair.
5. A minimum of two exhibits must be allocated to each of the major exhibit departments (at county level) to go to State Fair.
6. Exhibitors must have participated in the project or program from which the exhibit is an outgrowth.
7. The exhibit is to be an outgrowth of work done to accomplish a goal(s) determined by the member or group during the current 4-H year.
8. All entries must be made in the name of the county and certified by an extension staff member.

What’s in a Ribbon?

Competition for premiums in 4-H and FFA classes is limited to youth enrolled in the Floyd County 4-H and FFA organizations. Youth must be in grades 4th-12th. Youth in K-3rd grades do not receive a competition ribbon or premium, but will receive a green ribbon of participation.

Premium awards are made and premium checks drawn only upon evidence contained in the judges’ award books. Premium stickers or ribbons attached to exhibits will not be accepted as evidence that articles are entitled to premium payments.

Agriculture and Natural Resources

No limit on the number of entries in Agriculture and Natural Resources.

Animal Science

An exhibit (other than the animal itself) that shows learning about a large or small animal including beef, dairy cattle, dairy goats, dogs, horse & pony, meat goats, pets, poultry, rabbits, sheep, swine, etc. Ownership of an animal is not required.

Veterinary Science

An exhibit that shows learning about keeping animals healthy, animal diseases, animal/human interaction, or other learning related to Veterinary Science.

Crop Production and Plant Science

An exhibit that shows learning about growth, use, and value of field crops, plant growth, soils, and soil fertility, or any other learning related to crop production and plant science.

Conservation, Environment, and Sustainability

An exhibit that shows the connections between humans and their environment including energy, energy conservation, stewardship, conservation, creating habitat, etc.

Entomology

An exhibit (excluding live specimens) that shows learning or is an outgrowth of an entomology or bee project experience. Includes specimen collections and may include products (ex: honey) or equipment as part of the display.

Fish and Wildlife

An exhibit that shows learning about a fish and/or wildlife project or program such as identification, habitats, harvest, taxidermy, etc. Any specimens must have been legally taken and must include information about date and location of harvest, and who the specimen was acquired from if not self-harvested. Feral pigs (including Russian/European Boar) are NOT permitted in taxidermy exhibits

Forestry

An exhibit, including collections, that show learning from participation in a forestry project or program.

Horticulture and Plant Science

An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of plants, soils, small fruit production, vegetable and flower gardens, plant nutrition, careers, etc. (Garden crops and herbs are exhibited in classes in the 4-H Horticulture Show.)

Home Grounds Improvement

An exhibit that shows learning about landscape plans, selection of landscape plants, ornamental garden features, home yard improvement, storage sheds, careers, etc.

Outdoor Adventures

An exhibit that shows learning about backpacking, biking, camping, canoeing, fishing, hiking, or other outdoor activities.

Safety and Education Shooting Sports

An exhibit that shows learning about safe and responsible use of firearms and archery equipment or wildlife management. (The exhibit may not include actual firearms; archery equipment allowed if tips are removed from arrows).

Other Agriculture & Natural Resources

An exhibit that shows learning about agriculture or natural resources and does not fit in any of the classes listed above.

Horticulture Show

- Each exhibitor may have only 1 entry in each class with a limit of 6 total entries. The exhibitor will not need to specify which individual vegetables will be exhibited when submitting entries in FairEntry, just enter that many entries.
- Misc. Vegetables may exhibit 6 different varieties with a limit of 6 total entries. An exhibitor may have 1 entry in the vegetable container division. Flowers should not be added to the collection of vegetables.
- Vegetables are to be displayed on heavy paper, plastic, or Styrofoam plates of suitable size. There is to be no cover on the vegetables.
- Exhibitors are allowed 1 entry in each of the Floriculture classes. Exhibitors should refer to “Preparing Cut Flowers and House Plants for Exhibit” <https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/400> for exhibiting guidelines and evaluation criteria for these classes. Floriculture exhibitors need to provide their own containers. Covered pop/water bottles work well. Fancy vases and pots are discouraged.
- The exhibitor is to bring their entries to the judge’s table for judging.
- When preparing produce for display, strict attention should be paid to “Harvesting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit” <https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/394> to properly exhibit your produce.
- Exhibitors MUST label their exhibits indicating the kind and variety (i.e. Kind: Tomato, Slicing Variety: Better Boy). 3x5 index cards are recommended.

Flower Arrangement/Basket

An arrangement of flowers grown in the exhibitor's garden. Judging will be based on the specimen, the arrangement, and the container. Include a card with the name of the flowers and the specific varieties.

Potted Plant (foliage/flowering houseplant)

A plant which has been potted and cared for by the exhibitor. The member must label the exhibit as to what type of plant it is. Include a card with information about the plant, how to care for it, size it will grow to be, etc.

Other Floriculture

Any exhibit which is an outgrowth of flower gardening and ornamentals, home gardening, small fruit crop, vegetable crop and home grounds improvement, etc. The exhibit should include written statement about ideas learned. Topic should focus on specific concept such as cultivar selection, plant nutrition, insect, weed, or disease control, harvesting, preservations, marketing or career opportunities.

On Site Garden

Judging occurs prior to fair. Gardens judged on maintenance and care, plant spacing, insect and weed control, design and arrangement, plant selection, etc. Categories: home gardening, commercial gardening, flower/ornamental, landscaping. A folder will be prepared based on the items mentioned above and will be displayed during fair.

Vegetable Container Display

- Display must include 5 or more different vegetable crops grown in the exhibitor's home garden.
- For this class, herbs will count as vegetable crops.
- More than 1 variety of any particular vegetable can be displayed, however, not more than 4 items of the same vegetable can be displayed. (i.e. 1 large red slicing, 1 cherry tomato, 1 yellow tomato, and 1 processing tomato would constitute 1 vegetable-tomato).
- The amount of produce exhibited should fit into the container.
- The display will be reduced 1 placing if it contains more than 4 vegetables of any 1 kind (more than 4 beans).
- The vegetables should be prepared for exhibit as instructed in 4H462, "Harvesting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit." Any decorative basket, box, or other decorative container, not larger than 1/2 bushel in size, can be used.
- The exhibit will be judged 75% for the cultural perfection of the vegetables and 25% for decorative arrangement. A variety card **MUST** accompany the exhibit with each crop clearly labeled as to the variety.

First Year Exhibitor's Class

Plate of mixed vegetables. Plate is to consist of 1 tomato, 1 onion, 1 pepper, and 2 other vegetables of the exhibitor's choice. A variety card must accompany the exhibit with each crop clearly labeled as to the variety.

Creative Arts

Exhibitors may have a maximum of 10 Entries in the Creative Arts Division.

Music

An exhibit that shows learning about musical performance, composition, arrangements, instruments, musical styles, or history.

Photography

An exhibit, either photo(s) or an educational display, that shows learning about photography from choosing a camera to modifying your photo. Still photos only, not video.

Photography Special Rules:

1. Photographs may be either black and white or color. Photographs must have been taken since your county fair of the previous year.
2. Photographs should be a minimum of 5"x7". Finished size (including mounting/matting) of single photographs may not exceed 11"x14". Exception: Panoramic photos must not exceed 24" in length.
3. All photographs must be printed on photographic paper and must be mounted and/or matted. Maximum thickness of finished project must not exceed 1/4" thick.
4. Mounted photos can be (a) flush-mounted [no board showing] on mounting board, or (b) with mount borders [window mat or flat mount directly on board]. Exhibitors may cut their own mounting boards, use ready-cut window mats or have matting done professionally.
 - **4-H members are responsible for design decisions such as mounting, matting, color, and size.**
 - **Framed photographs (including floating frames) will not be judged.**
5. A series is a group of photographs [3 to 5] that are related or tell a step-by-step story. Photographs must be mounted together in story order or sequence. Finished size of individual photographs in a series should not exceed 6"x8".
6. Edited photos should include a copy of the photo before edits.
7. Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.
8. Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.
9. 4-H photography exhibitors must use the most current Photo Exhibit Label to provide required information for photo exhibits.
10. Exhibitors entered in 4-H Photography are not eligible to exhibit in the FFA Photography Show and vice-versa.

Creative Photography

A photographic image that was creatively edited or modified beyond reality in a creative, imaginative and experimental way to make it more interesting and visually engaging. Could be a composite of multiple photographs.

Creative Photography Special Rules:

1. Photograph/image may be mounted/matted or submitted (uploaded) as a digital image.
2. If mounted, photograph/image must be mounted on foam core no smaller than 4” in length or larger than 14” in length.
3. Photograph/Image can be digitally created or from a film negative.
4. Exhibit must have the most current Photo Exhibit Label on back with required information for photo exhibits. Exhibit write up should include additional information about the processes and decisions used to develop exhibit.
5. Subject matter must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting. Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.

Photography Idea/Educational Display

An exhibit that demonstrates learning about photography that does not fit into any previous photography class. This class may include educational displays about printing, processing, editing, marketing, branding, merchandising, etc., as it relates to photography.

Visual Arts – Original Art

An exhibit that shows learning through creation of original art. Original art is a one-of-a-kind, non-replicable design of your creation. By using one medium or a combination, an individual creates an authentic work of art that is not recognizable as another’s work. You must explain the application of the most relevant design element(s) and art principle(s) featured in this exhibit. Describe your inspirations, reasons, feelings, and/or motives for creating this work of art.

Visual Arts – Design, Process, or Technique Exploration

This class emphasizes process and provides the opportunity to explore a medium, practice a skill, or study and apply elements and principles of art and design. An explanation of the application of design elements or art principles used when making the exhibit must be included. This exhibit may be an object, portfolio, display, poster, or organized sketchbook. If a non-original design source is used, its origin (where the idea was found, any pictures, sketches, etc.) must be credited, acknowledged, or have copyright permission obtained. See visual arts special rule #5 and #6.

Visual Arts – Other Visual Art Ideas / Topics

Exhibits might include the study and research about an individual artist, style, craft, business or marketing process, planning group tour, career options, etc.

Visual Arts Special Rules:

1. Items entered for exhibition should be ready for display in the home, gallery, or intended final display location: pictures framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers.
2. Exhibits made from kits or preformed molds will not be accepted. Exception: Preformed molds (greenware, whiteware) may be used to provide the appropriate surface for a process technique or application of original design.
3. If the exhibit is a finished art object, the source of inspiration of the design, design sketches, or other process for creating the object and design must be included. For additional information see the Visual Arts and Design Elements & Art Principles Exhibit Tip Sheets at: <https://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/exhibit-tip-sheets>.
4. If the exhibit is a finished art object, information must be included explaining the application of design elements and art principles used in creation of the work.
5. Original works of art must be a creative expression of a design unique to the artist or represent a significant modification to an existing design to make a new and original statement by the artist.
6. Exhibition of derivative works created by a 4-H member is prohibited without the written permission of the original copyright holder/owner. Use of copyrighted or trademarked designs, images, logos, or materials in 4-H visual arts exhibits is prohibited unless written permission has been obtained from the copyright or trademark holder/owner. Family and Consumer Sciences

Superintendent: Barb McGregor

Exhibitors may have a maximum of 12 entries in the Family Consumer Sciences division.

Child Development

An exhibit that shows learning about children. Exhibits that include items intended for use with children (books, toys, learning games, babysitting kits, etc.) should include information about what you have learned 1) about children while creating and using the exhibit or 2) what the child(ren) learned from use of the item(s) in the exhibit. Exhibit examples include careers in child development, caring for children with special needs, childcare, growth and development, safety and health, etc.

Clothing & Fashion – Constructed/Sewn Garments & Accessories

A constructed garment or accessory (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and/or clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

Clothing & Fashion – Purchased Garments & Accessories

Purchased garments or accessories that show learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and/or clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

Clothing & Fashion – Other Ideas/Educational Ideas

Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about clothing and fashion including design illustrations, exploration of clothing styles, careers, clothing care, etc.

Clothing and Fashion Special Rules:

1. Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the Awardrobe Clothing Event may not be entered as another county or state fair exhibit.

2. Exhibits in Clothing & Fashion – Constructed/Sewn & Purchased Garments and Clothing & Fashion – Purchased Garments & Accessories must include information about application of design elements and art principles. Exhibits in Clothing & Fashion—Other Ideas/Education Ideas should include information about application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.

Consumer Management

An exhibit that shows learning through savvy budgeting, comparison shopping, money management, or consumer rights and responsibilities.

Food & Nutrition – Prepared Product

An exhibit of a prepared food product that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, or safety practices through the making of a prepared or preserved food product. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 “Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs - Quick Reference Guide (2023)” at <https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434> for additional information regarding prepared food products.

Food & Nutrition – Preserved Product

An exhibit of a preserved food product that shows skills or learning about food preservation through the making of a prepared or preserved food product. Processed honey may be exhibited in this class. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 “Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs - Quick Reference Guide (2023)” at <https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434> for additional information regarding preserved food products.

Food & Nutrition – Educational Display

An educational exhibit (poster, report, display) that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, meal planning/preparation and service, safety practices, or food preservation. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 “Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide (2023)” at <https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434> for additional information regarding prepared and preserved food products. Exhibits showing learning about meal planning & service must include a menu.

Food & Nutrition Special Rules:

1. Any exhibit considered to be a food safety risk or portray a food safety risk will not be accepted, judged, or displayed.
2. All food products/exhibits should be appropriate for human consumption.

3. Food product exhibits must be prepared, baked, or cooked using only food-grade utensils and containers.
4. Products that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged, or displayed.
5. Meat jerky products are prohibited.
6. The recipe must be included for any prepared or preserved food exhibit, including the source of the recipe.
7. Preserved foods must include the Preserved Food 4-H Exhibit Label. Only food processed after August 1, 2022, is acceptable. Current USDA and/or Iowa State University guidelines for home food preservation must be used. Processed honey must include the Honey Label for 4-H Exhibits.
8. Preserved food exhibits **must** include two product samples. One will be opened for evaluation and discarded; the second will be placed on display and returned to the exhibitor. All perishable food products will be discarded when removed from display.
9. Prepared foods should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard. Place food product exhibit in a re-closable plastic bag with entry tag fastened outside the bag.
Recommended number of items to include with the exhibit:
 - Cookies, cupcakes, bars, muffins, rolls, etc. –four (4) to six (6) items
 - Cakes, loafs, pies, etc. – one (1) whole product
10. The use of alcoholic beverages in the preparation or production of 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted.

Food Challenge Class

1. The purpose of this contest is to use only the following recipe to make, bake and present your best. This entry cannot advance to the Iowa State Fair.
2. All members are eligible to enter. The member does not have to be enrolled in the Food and Nutrition project.
3. Member may enter one (1) entry only.
4. Prepared food should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard. Place in a re-closable bag with an entry tag fastened outside the bag.

Birthday Morning Cinnamon Rolls

Ingredients:

4 1/2 to 5 cups flour	3/4 cup packed brown sugar
1 envelope dry yeast	1/4 cup flour
1 cup milk	1 tablespoon cinnamon
1/3 cup margarine or butter	1/2 cup margarine or butter
1/3 cup sugar	1/2 cup raisins
1/2 teaspoon salt	1/2 cup pecans
3 eggs	

Directions:

1. Mix 2 1/4 cups of the flour and yeast in a large bowl.
2. Combine the milk, 1/3 cup margarine, 1/3 cup sugar, and salt in a small saucepan. Heat to 120 to 130 degrees, stirring constantly.
3. Add the milk mixture to the yeast mixture and mix well. Add the eggs and mix until smooth. Stir in as much of the remaining 2 1/4 to 2 3/4 cups flour as needed to form a dough.
4. Knead on a lightly floured surface for 3 to 5 minutes or until smooth and elastic. Place in a greased bowl, turning to coat the surface.
5. Let rise, covered, in a warm place for 1 hour or until doubled in bulk. Punch the dough down; let rest for 5 minutes.
6. Roll the dough into a 12x16-inch rectangle on a floured surface.
7. Combine the brown sugar, 1/4 cup flour, and cinnamon in a bowl. Cut in 1/2 cup margarine until crumbly. Sprinkle over the dough. Top with the raisins and pecans.
8. Roll up the dough to enclose the filling. Cut into 8 slices. Place cut side down in a greased baking pan and cover loosely with greased plastic wrap.
9. Chill for 2 to 24 hours. Let stand, uncovered, at room temperature for 30 minutes.
10. Bake at 375 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes or until light brown. Invert onto a tray.

Yield: 8 servings

Health

An exhibit that shows learning through food choices, physical activity, safe activities, skills such as first aid and CPR, careers, and/or healthy lifestyle choices.

Home Improvement

An exhibit that shows learning in planning, improving, and caring for your home living space, including extended personal living areas immediately adjacent to the home. Exhibits may include new or refinished/reclaimed/restored items. Exhibits showing learning about home design, furniture, home accessories, and fabrics must include information about how design elements and art principles were applied.

Home Improvement Special Rules:

1. Items entered for exhibition should be ready for display in the home: pictures framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers.
2. Exhibit write-up/information must include source of inspiration and/or references indicating where the idea or information was obtained, giving credit to original author(s), designer(s), and/or artist(s).

Sewing & Needle Arts

Constructed item (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning and skill in sewing, knitting, crocheting, or other needle arts. May include the construction of household items such as pillowcases, curtains, table runners, quilts, wall hangings, etc. Exhibits in this class are not intended to be worn by humans. Exhibits should include information about application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.

Sewing & Needle Arts—Other Ideas/Educational Exhibits

Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about sewing and needle arts including construction techniques, use and care of fabrics and fibers, design illustrations, decorative processes, careers, etc. Exhibits should include information about application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.

Other Family and Consumer Science

An exhibit that demonstrates learning about a family and consumer science topic that does not fit any other Family and Consumer Science class listed.

Thrifty Meal Challenge

Create a balanced nutritious meal (breakfast, lunch, or dinner) for a family of four (4) that includes a serving from each of the five food groups with a budget of \$11.

Thrifty Meal Challenge Special Rules:

1. One (1) exhibit in this class may advance to the Iowa State Fair.
2. All entries will receive an evaluation and ribbon.
3. Exhibits may be from an individual or group effort.
4. The meal must include a serving for each person from each of the five (5) food groups.

Recommended portion sizes per person

1/2 cup fruit

1/2 cup vegetables

3 ounces protein

1-2 ounces grain

1 cup equivalent dairy

5. The meal must serve four (4) people.
6. Total expense on receipt(s) must not exceed \$11.
7. The exhibit will be a poster (maximum size 20" x 30") that includes:
 - a. Menu
 - b. Meal type (breakfast, lunch, or dinner)
 - c. Copy of receipts (up to 2)
 - d. Photos of participant experience
 - e. Thrifty Meal Challenge Worksheet (required)

Personal Development

No limit on the number of entries in Personal Development with the exception of 4-H Poster Communications

Citizenship & Civic Engagement

An exhibit that shows learning about or contributing to your community, your country, or your world.

Communication

An exhibit that shows learning about written, oral, or visual communication skills. Includes learning from participation in Theatre Arts projects or programs such as puppets, stage design, etc. May include original creative writing, poetry, fiction, non-fiction, etc.

4-H Poster Communication Exhibit

Special poster exhibit to visually tell a story or idea about 4-H to the general public. Exhibitors must use one of the following themes:

- 4-H is . . . (open to 4-H'er's interpretation)
- Join 4-H
- Opportunity4All (2022 National 4-H Week theme)
- Spy Your Potential (2023 Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme)
- Best Days Ever (in 4-H) (variation of Iowa State Fair theme)

Poster Communication Special Rules:

1. Only one (1) poster per 4-H member. Individual participation only. Any currently enrolled 4-H member who has completed 4th-12th grade, may create a poster. Only currently enrolled 4-H members that have completed 5th-12th grade will be eligible for the Iowa State Fair.
2. All posters must be designed on, or affixed to, standard poster board or foam core board: size minimum of 14" x 20" or maximum of 15" x 22".
3. Posters may be vertical or horizontal. Posters may be any medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils, collage, etc.
4. Posters cannot be 3-dimensional. Materials used to make the poster may not extend more than 1/8 inch above the poster or foam core board.
5. Each poster **must** have the completed Poster Exhibit Entry Form attached to the back.
6. Poster cannot use copyrighted material or exact copies of other promotional designs, such as the Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme logo.
7. 4-H members may include the 4-H clover in the poster.

Digital Storytelling

An exhibit that demonstrates the application of technology to produce a creative movie/film/video. Exhibits may include a finished movie or video, creation of a detailed storyboard, editing techniques using digital video software, production techniques, or other display to share what was learned. Copyright permission must be obtained for any non-original material included as part of a film/movie/video.

Leadership

An exhibit that shows learning about leadership skills and influencing others in a positive way.

Self-Determined

An exhibit that shows learning as part of your 4-H adventure and does not fit any other class.

Science, Engineering, and Technology

No limit on the number of entries in Science, Engineering, and Technology.

Science, Engineering & Technology Special Rules:

1. Exhibitors entered in the 4-H Science, Engineering & Technology classes are not eligible to exhibit in similar FFA Ag Mechanics classes and vice versa.

Mechanics

An exhibit that shows skills or learning about general mechanics or engineering solutions or that involve a combination of skills.

Automotive

Repaired or restored vehicle.

Automotive – Educational Display

An exhibit that shows learning about an automotive idea including automotive maintenance, auto operations, auto safety, or automotive systems.

Electric

Constructed or repaired article or educational display that shows skills or learning about electric wiring, appliances, lighting, electrical energy sources, safety, etc.

Small Engine

Repaired or restored operating engine or educational display or other type of exhibit that shows skills or learning about small engines. This class includes repaired or restored lawn tractors, small motorcycles, go-karts, etc.

Tractor

Repaired or restored tractor.

Tractor – Educational Display

An exhibit that shows learning related to tractors, tractor mechanics, tractor operations, or tractor safety.

Welding

Constructed item or educational display that shows skills or learning about welding.

Woodworking

An exhibit that shows learning about wood, woodworking techniques, and safe uses of woodworking tools and machines. Exhibits may include newly constructed or refinished/reclaimed/restored wood items.

Science, Engineering, & Technology

An exhibit that shows learning about or helps explain how science and technology help us interact with the world. Topics include aerospace, biological and chemical sciences, computers and networking, earth and climate, geospatial mapping (GPS/GIS) or any other application of science, engineering, or technology.

Aerospace

Educational display or other exhibit (including flyable models) showing learning about an aerospace idea or topic.

Robotics

Educational display or other exhibit (including working robots) showing learning about robotics and robotic systems.

Awardrobe Clothing Event

1. Each youth may only participate in the 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event with only one entry in each class per year.
2. Junior and Intermediate 4-H members may participate at the Floyd County Fair but may not advance to the Iowa State Fair. Participants must be in the senior 4-H designated level (completed grades 9-12) for 2023.
3. Outfits or accessories which will be worn in the Clothing Event may not be entered as another county or state fair exhibit.
4. Participants must bring the garment or outfit they purchased or created, and accessories, to the 4-H Clothing Event. Participants should submit only the materials requested for each class (report form and photo – for ALL classes - plus a receipt for \$20 challenge). If additional materials are sent with the entry or brought to the conference judging, they will not be considered.
5. Participant report forms must be brought the day of conference judging.

Fashion Revue

1. The purpose of this class is to encourage the construction of a personal garment or outfit.
2. Consideration is given to fit, style, suitability, quality of construction, stage presentation, and required care.
3. Youth participants will model a garment or outfit they constructed, hand-knitted, machine-knitted, or crocheted during the current 4-H year.
4. A garment or outfit consisting of one to three pieces such as, but not limited to, party clothes, tailored suits, vest, slacks, shirt, skirt, active sportswear, and/or coats.
5. Blouses, shirts, and sweaters are usually considered as garments. If they are used to complete an outfit, they may be constructed or selected.
6. All other accessories and undergarments may be constructed or selected.

Clothing Selection

1. The purpose of this class is to select and/or purchase an outfit that represents the 4-H member's goal or intended use for the selected outfit.
2. Judging is based on fit, color, style, suitability, quality and construction features, stage presentation, required care, and cost comparison.
3. There is no consideration in the judging on the amount spent, only in the process of record keeping and reflection on the cost of the individual items as part of the process.
4. Outfits may be purchased at a department store, boutique, online store, sidewalk sales, retail shops, or mall stores. Outfits may also be purchased at garage sales or other secondhand venues at any price point. Outfits may be gifts, hand-me-downs, relative or friend's modern or vintage clothing, or existing personal clothing as long as the 4-H member selected the item as part of this specific outfit for the stated purpose.

5. Home-sewn clothing that was not sewn specifically for the participant are acceptable, such as purchases from a used clothing store.

The \$20 Challenge

1. This class is designed to expand the 4-H member's shopping experience to shopping venues emphasizing recycling, reducing, and reusing. Outfits must be purchased at a garage sale, consignment store, thrift store, secondhand store, or similar place.
2. Online venues are allowed, must be second-hand in nature. Shipping and handling are not included in the total calculations.
3. Traditional shopping venues may not be used, regardless of a low regular or sale price. Hand-me-downs or clothing as gifts do not qualify for this class.
4. Twenty dollars is the purchase price limit including tax. However, some secondhand stores and venues do not typically charge sales tax.
5. Receipt(s) for every item included as a part of the calculated total must be submitted with the entry. A garage sale receipt can be a piece of paper with the name of the location such as "Jane Doe garage sale", date, amount paid, and signature of person selling at the garage sale. If the outfit was free at a garage sale, "free" can be listed on the report form and on the receipt. Failure to provide receipts will be reflected in the evaluation.
6. An outfit consists of major clothing pieces such as a shirt and pants or a dress. Shoes, undergarments, and accessories are not included in the \$20 purchase price limit.
2. Alterations are permitted to achieve a desired look or fit.
3. There are no additional considerations for an outfit that totals less than \$20.
4. The outfit pieces should be purchased to meet the 4-H member's goal or intended use for the purchased outfit, and the 4-H member should have had an experience in choosing shopping alternatives, evaluating fit, quality and construction features, price, and cost comparison.

Innovative Design

1. The purpose of this class is to encourage creativity and out-of-the-box thinking when creating an outfit.
2. These designs can be theatrical costumes, cosplay, wearable technology, sustainable/upcycled fashion, accessible fashion, and/or outfits that use unconventional materials.
3. The outfit must be showcased as a worn garment modeled by the exhibitor or by the individual that it was designed for.
4. Exhibitors may make their garment entirely, or permanently alter the silhouette of pre-existing materials through some method of permanent alteration or addition.
5. Consideration is given to originality and innovation.

Communication Event

Purpose: The Communication Event Program provides opportunities for 4-H youth to develop their personal communication skills by sharing talents, knowledge, or information with others. The events provide a series of developmental experiences for different age levels.

General Communication Event Program Rules

1. 4-H members who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2023 are eligible to participate at the Iowa State Fair. Exception: Share-The-Fun and Extemporaneous Speaking - See class rules for age guidelines.
2. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits may be given by one or more 4-H members. Teams consisting of youth of mixed grades will be subject to the time limits based on the grade of the member in the highest grade level (i.e., a team with a 5th grader and an 8th grader will use the times for the intermediate/senior class).
3. Topics selected by the 4-H member(s) should be an outgrowth of their 4-H experience(s). Topics should be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
4. A 4-H member may participate in only one presentation, one working exhibit, two Share the Fun acts, and one extemporaneous speaking per year at the Floyd County Fair.
5. Participants in the 4-H Communication Programs are expected to wear appropriate clothing representative of the 4-H Youth Program and/or the topic of the presentation. (i.e., beekeeping outfit while doing a presentation or working exhibit on bee raising)
6. 4-H'ers must use sanitary and safe procedures and methods at all times. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits involving food must follow established food safety guidelines.
7. All participants are expected to comply with all copyright/trademark regulations. Copyrighted material may not be distributed without permission.

Educational Presentations

Provide an opportunity for 4-H members to demonstrate communication skills by presenting knowledge, information, or a process to an audience.

Junior Presenter (5th and 6th grade)

Intermediate/Senior Presenter (7th – 12th grade)

Educational Presentation Rules

1. Time limit: Junior Presentations (5th and 6th grade) must not exceed 15 minutes. Intermediate/Senior Presentations (7th - 12th grade) must not exceed 20 minutes.
2. Presentation content must be the original work of the presenter(s). Extensive paraphrasing from other sources is prohibited. Use of brief quotations or excerpts of from other work(s) is permitted provided the source is identified.
3. 4-H members may participate in one Educational Presentation per year at the Floyd County Fair and Iowa State Fair

Working Exhibits

Provide an opportunity for 4-H members to communicate, interact with, and teach an audience in an informal and experiential way.

Junior Presenter (5th and 6th grade)

Intermediate/ Senior Presenter (7th – 12th grade)

Working Exhibit Rules

1. Time limit: All participants/teams will be scheduled for a 30-minute period.
2. All methods used should be safe for involvement by audiences of all ages.
3. Due to the nature of the exhibit, many stages of the exhibit or product should be ready so any step can be discussed. No set format should be used. Questions that might be asked to entice participants are: Have you seen...? Would you like to know how to...? May I show you how to...?
4. 4-H members may participate in one Working Exhibit per year at the Floyd County Fair and Iowa State Fair.

Share the Fun

Provide an opportunity for 4-H members to share their skills and talents before an audience purely for the sake of enjoyment.

Share the Fun Presenter (4th – 12th grade)

Share-The-Fun Rules

1. Share-The-Fun performances must not exceed six (6) minutes in length.
2. Skits, songs, stunts, short one-act plays, dance, and other entertainment are acceptable. All performances must be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
3. To be eligible to participate in the Share the Fun program at the Iowa State Fair, 4-H members must have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2023. Exception: If the Share-The-Fun act involves a whole club, the following criteria must be applied to determine if the club can be entered in the Share-The-Fun Program at the Iowa State Fair:
 - At least 80 percent of the performing group must have completed 5th through 12th grade in 2023.
 - Clover Kids are not eligible to participate at the Iowa State Fair.
4. 4-H members may participate in a maximum of two Share-the-Fun performances per year at the Floyd County Fair.

Extemporaneous Speaking

Encourage the development of communication skills by providing an opportunity to think, organize thoughts, prepare a speech, and respond to questions when given a limited amount of preparation time.

Single Presenter (9th – 12th grade)

Extemporaneous Speaking Rules

5. Participants must be senior 4-H members – completed 9th through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2023.
6. 4-H members may participate in one Extemporaneous Speaking per year at the Floyd County Fair and Iowa State Fair. Individual participation only.
7. Program format:
 - a. Thirty minutes before the program, each participant will draw three of the available topics, selecting one to speak on.
 - The general nature of the topics will relate to 4-H. The selected topic will not be available to the other participants. The other two topics drawn but not chosen will be returned to the available topics for the other participants.
 - b. A preparation room is to be used with one participant per speaking site admitted initially and one additional participant will be admitted every 10 minutes as the program progresses. A participant may not leave the preparation room until it is time to speak, nor may a participant receive help from a parent, leader, other adult, or any other youth. A program official will assist participants with the time requirements.
 - c. All reference material will be screened by a program official on the following basis:
 - Participant may bring their own books, magazines or newspaper clippings for reference during the 30 minutes of preparation.
 - Reference material must be printed material such as books or magazines (cannot be notes, outlines, or speeches prepared by the participant or by another person for use in this program).
 - Some relevant reference material will be available in the preparation room. This material will consist of historical material related to the 4-H program.
 - d. Each speech shall be the result of the 4-H members own efforts using approved reference material that a participant may bring to the preparation room. No other assistance may be provided. Plain 3x5 note cards will be provided for each participant in the preparation room. If notes are used, the note cards provided must be used in delivering the speech.
 - e. Only notes made during the preparation period may be used.
 - f. Each speech shall be not less than four but no more than six minutes with five minutes additional time allowed for related questions, which shall be asked by the

- judge. The participant will be shown timecards in an ascending order (1, 2, 3, 4, 5) by the timekeeper. “Stop” will be said at six minutes.
- g. The participant will be expected to introduce their speech by title only.
 - h. Participants are not permitted to use any props, gadgets, posters or audiovisuals of any sort. A podium will not be available.
8. Speeches will be evaluated using the following criteria:
- a. Content related to topic
 - b. Knowledge of the subject
 - c. Organization of material
 - d. Power of expression
 - e. Voice
 - f. Stage presence
 - g. General effect
 - h. Response to questions
9. A judge’s critique/conference with each participant will be included after the presentation.

Challenge Classes

Tall Corn Contest

An event open to all Floyd County Clover Kids, 4-H members, and FFA members with the goal of growing the tallest corn stalk in a 5-gallon bucket.

Tall Corn Contest Special Rules:

1. Participants must register with the Floyd County Extension Office by April 21st. A limited number of buckets are available.
2. Seeds and buckets will be available for pick-up beginning on April 27.
3. Planting date will be determined by the exhibitor. Seeds may be treated, so please wear the provided gloves when planting seed(s). Please note there are 2-3 seeds provided in each envelope, it is up to each individual on the number of seeds chosen to plant in the bucket but **ONLY** the tallest corn (that is in the Cropwise Consulting, LLC. bucket) will be judged.
4. The corn seed provided **MUST** be planted **IN THE** bucket provided by Cropwise Consulting, LLC., and **no** decorating will be allowed. Corn is not to be transplanted.
5. All additives (ex. fertilizer) are allowed.
6. Participants may drop off their 5-gallon Cropwise Consulting, LLC. bucket with their corn on the north side of the Youth Enrichment Center (YEC) on the Floyd County Fairground on July 18 between 9 am – 3 pm.
7. Tall corn contest exhibits will not be judged as a static exhibit and do not require a write-up.
8. The Tall Corn contest winners will not receive premiums.
9. There will be an overall winner for the “Tallest Corn” along with winners in the following categories – Clover Kids, 4-H members, and FFA members. Winners will be announced at the Fame, Fun, and Royalty on Tuesday, July 18 starting at 6:30 pm.

Recycled Art Contest

The Floyd County Fair Recycled Art Contest is for fun and the thrill of competing with other recycled outdoor enthusiasts. Let your creativity flow while doing good for the earth! We all know that you’re supposed to reduce, reuse, and recycle, but for artists, reuse and recycle often have totally different meanings than they do for the rest of us.

Recycled art is creative work that’s made from discarded materials that once had another purpose. This includes anything from old plastic toys, and vehicle tires to scraps of cloth and building supplies. Artists who make recycled art take those materials and make them into something new.

Recycled Art Contest Guidelines:

1. The contest is open to all Clover Kid and 4-H members. Entries in the contest will not receive ribbons or premiums and will not be considered for state fair. A goal card is not required for the recycled yard art contest.
 - Optional: 4-H members can choose to enroll this project also as a static exhibit. All static rules must be applied including a goal card. The member's goal should reflect the static class selected. One class option could be Home Grounds Improvement under Ag and Natural Resources.
2. Static exhibits will be judged during their club time slot all other entries competing in just the contest must deliver their project to the Floyd County Youth Enrichment Center on Tuesday, July 18 no later than 4 pm.
3. Entries must be made entirely of recycled or previously used materials. Entries made with glass will not be accepted. The entry must be light weight enough to be moved for display purposes. Exhibits will be displayed outside so they must be weather resistant and be able to withstand the wind and rain during the fair. Exhibits can be anchored by the member if needed.
4. To be eligible for the Recycled Art Contest, participants must register for the Recycled Art Contest class under Challenge Classes in FairEntry. Entries are due in FairEntry by Friday, June 23 at 11:59 pm.

Judging:

1. Fair visitors will vote on their choice during the fair. Only one vote will be allowed per person.
2. An award basket will be given for each of the following divisions:
 - Best Clover Kids entry (kindergarten – 3rd grade)
 - Best 4th-8th grade entry
 - Best 9th-12th grade entry
3. Voting will take place through noon on Saturday, July 22nd. Winners will be announced at 12:30 pm at the Little Hands on the Farm building on Saturday, July 22nd.

Tested Vanilla Buttercream Recipe
Required for use with Iowa 4-H Fair Food Product Exhibits.

(All Iowa 4-Hers must reference and attach this blog to their write-up for full credit if a homemade frosting is used in the exhibit. Any change or addition of ingredients will be unacceptable and will result in disqualification.)

1 cup unsalted butter, slightly softened	1 teaspoon vanilla extract
4 cups powdered sugar	2 Tablespoons dairy milk (skim, 2%, or whole)
¼ teaspoon salt	

Beat the butter, salt, and vanilla together until fully combined on medium speed. Reduce speed and add the powdered sugar and milk. Add the milk a teaspoon at a time to achieve the right consistency for the way you want to use the frosting. **DO NOT** use more than 2 tablespoons of milk. Slowly increase the speed of the mixer and beat until the frosting is light and fluffy.

What Does This Mean for Iowa 4-H Food Products?

- **It is highly suggested that exhibits be presented without frosting unless the frosting is part of the exhibit goal.**

Example 1: *My goal is to bake an angel food cake for exhibit at the fair.*

No frosting is needed for this exhibit. Cake recipe should be included with the exhibit.

Example 2*: *My goal is to bake and frost a chocolate cake for my Dad's birthday. I will also exhibit a similar cake and frosting at the fair.*

Cake should be frosted with the tested vanilla buttercream frosting or with a commercially prepared frosting to assure that it is not a TCS food. No chocolate, cocoa, or other ingredient should be added to the tested recipe or commercial frosting. Recipe for cake and frosting (if homemade) should be included with the exhibit, along with this blog.

Example 3*: *My goal is to learn to make a cake and a frosting for exhibit at the fair.*

Cake should be frosted with the tested vanilla buttercream frosting; no chocolate, cocoa, or other ingredient should be added to the tested recipe. Cake and frosting recipes, along with this blog, should be included with exhibit.

*For examples 2 and 3, another option is to prepare the product using any frosting desired; before serving, take pictures of the frosted product. Exhibit the product without frosting at the fair and note in the write up that the product is being exhibited without frosting due to food safety concerns. Add pictures of the frosted product to the write up and include the product recipe with the exhibit.

- **Homemade Cream Cheese, German Chocolate or Coconut-Pecan, Ganache, or 7-Minute frostings or fillings are not to be exhibited at the fair. They are potential TCS foods due to the range of water activity (A_w) in various recipes and should be stored in the refrigerator.**
- **Decorator frostings of any type may be used when the goal is to decorate a cake. The cake may be food, cardboard, or Styrofoam and will be judged on design, neatness, originality, skill, and technique; the cake will not be tasted or judged on product characteristics.**
- **Fresh or canned fruit, vegetable, or zest should not be used as decoration or garnish on a baked product or decorated cake.**
- **When a glaze is desired, it should be made with powdered sugar and water only. No fruit juice or zest should be added.**
